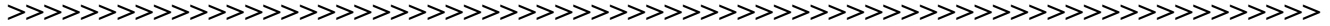

## **From the President's Desk.....**

WOW! Can you believe that summer is already here? Summer vacation plans have been made and now everyone is anxiously waiting for vacation time to arrive. Some of you are anticipating all of the fun you will have at the beach or at the amusement park. Some of these plans may include a trip to another area of our state or maybe a trip to visit a neighboring state. These plans may also include a visit with other members or your family while enjoying the beach or the amusement park or a day at a big family reunion. Wherever you go there is the possibility of learning more about your family history or history of that area.

Summer is a great time to get outside and explore. I have several family members that look forward to summer because they enjoy "geocaching". Geocaching is a modern day version of a treasure hunt that allows participants to use GPS coordinates to navigate their way to find the geocache (or container) that is hidden at that location. The rules of geocaching are simple. Once you find the geocache (or container), you must write about your find in the cache logbook. You must leave the cache item where you found it. If you decide to take something from the geocache, you must leave something of equal or greater value. After you return the cache to where you found it, you log your experience with the geocaching group on their website.

While listening to all of this explanation, I began to relate geocaching to my genealogy research. My search for ancestors reminds me of a treasure hunt. I am always looking for clues that will lead me to a parent, grandparent, aunt, uncle, cousin or sibling of someone that is hidden in my Family Tree. Instead of using GPS coordinates to drive along a county, state or federal highway, I use the "Information Highway" to search the internet for my ancestor or "geocache". If I am successful, I will find a container (treasure) filled with information about my ancestor. I make careful note of what the "geocache" contains before I leave it where I found it. Sometimes I might be able to add information to the geocache for the next person to find. Then I carefully document (or log) what I found into my Family Tree program. When I have finished that, I am ready to select another "geocache" item in my ongoing treasure hunt for ancestors.

Geocaching might be a way for me to get others in my family interested in genealogy. If we can combine the activities that each of us likes to do, there might be many adventures ahead for all of us. I could use the "geocaching" technique as a way to get my family interested in finding places that our family has lived in or emigrated from. We might use this activity to visit various cemeteries where some of our ancestors may have been buried. We could make notes about what their tombstone says and maybe leave a remembrance in the form of a flower or a flag.

## NEWS FROM THE PAST

(typed as written)

Ingham County Democrat, 12 July 1894

### **Ingham Democrat: A Newspaper published at Mason Forty-eight Years Ago.**

Volume two, number 25, Ingham Democrat, published every Monday morning at Mason, Ingham county, Michigan by Henry P. **Stillman**, Ephraim B. **Danforth** and Minos **McRobert**, proprietors. Terms – One dollar and fifty cents per annum in advance. Twenty-five cents will be added to this amount if not paid with in six months and fifty cents if not paid during the year. All kinds of produce will be received in payment at the highest price and town and county orders taken at par.

This copy of the Democrat was published Nov. 9, 1846, and is the 77<sup>th</sup> number. It is a five-column folio, printed with brevier and long primer type. The front page of the paper was mostly devoted to a sketch of the Spanish war, entitled “Cabrera, The Carlist Chief”, there were two short pieces of poetry and some miscellaneous matter. The following had business cards: Silas **Beebe**, general dealer, at Stockbridge; John W. **Phelps**, physician and surgeon; N. Dow **Tunnicliff**, attorney and counselor; Joseph C. **Obear**, tailor; Amaziah **Winchell**, notary public, Ingham; V. H. **Powell**, notary public, Leslie; Amos E. **Steele**, notary public, Mason Branch, master in chancery and justice of the peace, Stockbridge; Joseph **Woodhouse**, notary public, Leslie; Edward **Crafts**, Indian botanic physician and surgeon; Stockbridge House, O. **Williams**, proprietor; Minos **McRobert**, physician and surgeon.

Having difficulty in getting enough matter to fill, as newspapers do in these times, the business cards and other smaller ads were printed upon both sides. John **Douglass** of Alaiedon advertised a stray ox and D. **Gorsline** of Wheatfield had taken up a small bay mare for which he wanted an owner. Amos E. **Steele**, judge of probate, advertised that his court would be held on the first Monday of every month, but that business would be promptly attended to between regular sessions. Mr. **Steele** wanted 100 lbs of live geese feathers for which he would pay the highest cash price. John **Coatsworth**, lately deceased, as clerk of the county, had some legal notices.

Considerable space in the paper is taken with patent medicine ads and the advertisers get good worth of their money, as two columns of them are printed on both sides. On the last page is an extended controversy between D. C. **Whitwood** of Dexter and George **Matthew**, treasurer of the county, over the payment of some township and county orders. Mr. **Whithead** characterizes some of Mr. **Matthews'** statements as *base and infamous falsehoods* and states that the latter's word is not the best, and prints letters from three men to prove his charges. At that time as now filthy lucre was the cause of much trouble.

The Mexican war was in progress at that time and considerable space is given to the capture of Monterey and the orders issued by Gen. Taylor, several minor conflicts, etc., and highly commends the bravery of the U. S. troops. On the third page is a leap year story entitled “Popping the Question.”

A general election had just been held in which the contest was between the democrats and whigs. The former had the best of it in the county and state. Whigs at that time were up to the trick since practiced by the republicans – printing and circulating of spurious tickets – a democratic heading with the names of a majority of the whig nominees upon them. At this election Michigan was thoroughly democratic in Congress, Senate and House. The democrats elected nearly all the officers in Ingham county. **Bingham** for congress had a majority of 24. **Danforth** for state senator had 40. **Kilborn** for member of the legislature had one. The democratic candidate for county judge had 16. The second judge was defeated by six. George **Matthews**, whig candidate for county treasurer, was re-elected by four, two years before he had 23. Democratic candidates on the remainder of the ticket had the following majorities: Sheriff three, associate judges 15, clerk 25, register 36, judge of probate 13, surveyor 53.

In consequence of a deficiency in the returns from some of the towns, one of the whig coroners was declared elected although he received a minority of the votes. About 1,100 votes were polled in the county.

The result in the various townships was as follows: Vevay usually had from five to 10 whig, this year gave 33, the result of spurious ballots. Ingham democratic by 19. Stockbridge, democratic by 15. White Oak was the banner democratic town majorities from 38 to 40. Bunkerhill, small whig majority. Leslie, whig by 17 to 22. Onondaga, usually whig from 12 to 20, democratic throughout. Aurelius, democratic by small majority. Delhi, usually democratic, whig from one to three. Lansing, democratic eight to 10. Alaideon, whig by nine to 18.. Meridian, four to nine democratic. Wheatfield, average whig by five. Phelpstown (Williamston), gave some democrats a majority, usually whig by two. Locke and Leroy democratic.

Mr. **Danforth's** majority for the state senate was about 300. He carried every county in the district, but Kent. There were but few counties in the state but that went democratic at this election.

Through the courtesy of Mrs. O. B. **Stillman** of Meridian we are allowed to make these extracts. W. H. **Clark** of this city was a printer employed in the office and assisted in setting the type for that issue.

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### **Ingham County Democrat**, 12 July 1894

Census returns are completed. The townships not shown in the previous report show in their returns as follows: Leslie, 2,117; Leslie village, 982; Aurelius, 1,509; White Oak, 967. This makes the population of the county 30,534. At least two people are disappointed in the figures not reaching 40,000. That figure would have increase the judge of probate's salary from \$1,500 to \$1,800 and the probate register's \$500 to \$600. The census books were returned to the secretary of state by express Saturday evening.

- Geo. **Bennett**, of Locke, has a piece of wheat that the grasshoppers are taking as fast as it comes up.
- C. C. **Vaughn** of the Clinton Republican, St. Johns, was married to Miss Jennie **Hicks** last week Wednesday.
- James **Steinhoff**, of Alaiedon, makes cider every Tuesday during the season and each one can take back his own apple juice.
- Harvey **Cole** and Miss Carrie **Dell**, both of Alaiedon, were united in marriage at the residence of and by Rev. **Bird** in Wheatfield yesterday.
- Married at the residence of and by Rev. Napoleon **Smith** in this city, Sept. 15<sup>th</sup>, Edward **Dayton**, of White Oak, and Miss Carrie **DuBois** of Dansville.
- David M. **Lowe** and Miss Ida M. **Freeland**, both of Lansing, and former residents of this city were married in that city last week Wednesday afternoon.
- All persons indebted to me are requested to call and settle at once. C. F. **Brown**.
- The seven years old boy of A. P. **Pollock**, of Wheatfield, fell last Sunday and dislocated his left arm at the elbow. The arm was set by Dr. **Coad** of Williamston.
- Last Thursday morning at the residence of and by Rev. Napoleon **Smith**, Hiram E. **Foster** of Meridian and Miss Lizzie **Lounsbury** of Alaiedon were united in marriage
- A. D. **Pollock**, of Wheatfield, has an extra good crop of oats. The yield was 71 bushels and a peck per acre and weighted 36 ½ lbs to the bushel. The variety was the White Russian.
- A seven weeks' old baby of Mr and Mrs. Byron **Wright** died last week Wednesday night. Funeral services were held at the residence the following Friday forenoon at eleven o'clock, conducted by Rev. Napoleon **Smith**.
- Last Thursday afternoon the two large grain barns of B. **Bement** of Williamston, were destroyed by fire together with their contents of hay, grain, etc. The fire caught from sparks from an engine while thrashing. Mr. **Bement's** loss is about \$3000 with some insurance.
- Mason sends the following delegates to the second district representative convention: First ward – P. **Henderson**, H. L. **Chapin**, C. E. **Paddock**, A. W. **Parkhurst** and H. W. **Aseltine**. Second ward – C. W. **VanSlyke**, Jas E. **Ferguson**, Jas. A. **Sherwood**, H. S. **Every** and L. S. **Shattuck**.
- Last Thursday night the house and its entire contents belonging to Daniel **Juckett**, living four and one-half miles northwest of Williamston, was destroyed by fire. The house was thought to have been set on fire and Mr. **Juckett's** people barely had time to escape. Loss about \$2000. Insured about \$1000.
- The Democrat acknowledges a pleasant serenade early last Saturday morning from a company returning from a leap year party at Miss Mary **Brockway's**. Thanks, come again.
- Last Thursday morning the baby of Mr. & Mrs. J. F. **Greve** died, aged seven weeks. Rev. Napoleon **Smith** conducted the funeral services the next day at ten o'clock at the residence.
- The many friends of Bert E. **Ellis** of Lansing, who entered the railroad mail service last March, will be pleased to learn that he has been promoted one grade and salary increase from \$800 to \$900 per annum.
